Bible Study: The Book of Genesis

God's Sovereignty, Creation, Covenant, and Redemption

Session 1: Introduction to Genesis

Passages: Genesis 1:1-2:3

Key Theme: God as Creator

Discussion Questions & Answers

- I. How does knowing that God is the Creator influence our daily lives?

 Answer: It reminds us that life has purpose and meaning. If God created everything intentionally, then our lives, choices, and actions matter. It also instills trust in God's design for the world and our role within it.
- 2. What responsibilities come with being made in God's image? (Genesis 1:26-27)

Answer: We are called to reflect God's character—love, justice, and stewardship. Being made in His image means we should live morally, treat others with dignity, and care for His creation.

Application:

• Reflect on God's design for creation and our role in stewarding it.

Session 2: The Fall of Man & Sin's Consequences

Passages: Genesis 3

Key Theme: The Entrance of Sin & The First Promise of Redemption

Discussion Questions & Answers

I. How does Satan's tactic of deception still work today?

Answer: Satan often distorts God's word and makes sin appear desirable. Just as he convinced Eve to doubt God's goodness, he tempts us to question God's commands and seek self-fulfillment apart from Him.

2. What does Genesis 3:15 tell us about God's plan for salvation?

Answer: It is the first prophecy about Jesus Christ. God promises that a descendant of Eve (Jesus) will crush the serpent's head (defeat Satan), though He will be wounded in the process (Jesus' crucifixion).

Application:

• Identify areas where we are tempted and seek God's strength to resist.

Session 3: Noah & God's Judgment & Mercy

Passages: Genesis 6-9

Key Theme: God's Judgment, Mercy, and Covenant

Discussion Questions & Answers

I. How does Noah's faithfulness challenge us today?

Answer: Noah obeyed God despite opposition and ridicule. His faith encourages us to trust God even when it is unpopular or difficult.

2. What does the flood teach us about God's justice and mercy?

Answer: The flood shows that God is just and will not tolerate sin forever. However, His mercy is seen in sparing Noah and making a covenant never to destroy the world in the same way again.

Application:

Reflect on personal obedience in difficult situations.

Session 4: The Call of Abraham & God's Covenant

Passages: Genesis 12, 15, 22

Key Theme: Faith & Trust in God's Promises

Discussion Questions & Answers

I. What does Abraham's story teach us about trusting God?

Answer: Abraham left everything familiar to follow God's promise. His

journey shows that faith often requires patience and obedience, even when God's promises seem distant.

2. How does Genesis 22 point to Jesus?

Answer: Abraham was willing to sacrifice Isaac, just as God sacrificed His only Son. The ram provided as a substitute foreshadows Jesus as our substitute for sin.

Application:

• Consider where God is calling us to greater faith.

Session 5: Joseph - God's Providence in Trials

Passages: Genesis 37, 39-50

Key Theme: God's Sovereignty Over Life's Challenges

Discussion Questions & Answers

1. How did Joseph maintain his faith despite trials?

Answer: He trusted that God was in control, even when he was betrayed, enslaved, and imprisoned. Instead of becoming bitter, he remained faithful and relied on God's wisdom.

2. How does God use hardships in our lives for His purpose?

Answer: As seen in Genesis 50:20, God can turn evil intentions into opportunities for good. Trials often refine us, teach us dependence on God, and prepare us for greater things.

Application:

Trusting God in challenges and hardships.

Session 6: Conclusion - The Bigger Picture

Passages: Genesis 50:20, Romans 8:28

Key Theme: Genesis as the Foundation of God's Redemption Plan

Discussion Questions & Answers

1. How do the themes of Genesis prepare us for Jesus?

Answer: Genesis lays the groundwork for salvation—God's promise to redeem mankind, the foreshadowing of Christ, and the need for faith in His plan.

- 2. What lessons from Genesis can we apply in daily life?

 Answer:
 - o Trust God's timing (Abraham, Joseph).
 - o Stay faithful despite trials (Noah, Joseph).
 - o Believe in God's promises (God's covenant).

Application:

• Commit to living with faith, trust, and obedience to God.

Bible Study: The Book of Exodus

Deliverance, Covenant, and God's Presence
6 Sessions

Session 1: God's Deliverance - The Exodus from Egypt

Exodus 1-15 God Rescues His People

Discussion Questions & Answers

- Why did God allow the Israelites to become enslaved in Egypt? Answer: Their enslavement fulfilled God's prophecy to Abraham (Genesis 15:13) and demonstrated His power through their deliverance. It also reminded them of their dependence on God.
- 2. How does the story of the plagues show God's sovereignty?

 Answer: Each plague targeted an Egyptian god, proving that Yahweh alone is the true God. It also showed His power over nature and human rulers.
- 3. What is the significance of the Passover?

 Answer: The Passover foreshadowed Christ's sacrifice. Just as the blood of the lamb saved Israel's firstborn, Jesus' blood saves believers from eternal death.

Application:

- Trust that God delivers His people in His timing.
- Reflect on how Jesus is our Passover Lamb (1 Corinthians 5:7).

Session 2: The Red Sea and God's Provision

Passages: Exodus 14-17

Key Theme: Faith in God's Leading and Provision

Discussion Questions & Answers

- I. Why did God lead the Israelites to the Red Sea instead of a quicker route?

 Answer: To demonstrate His power through an impossible situation. It also tested their faith and reliance on Him.
- 2. How does the parting of the Red Sea relate to our faith today?

 Answer: Just as Israel had to step forward in faith, we must trust God even when circumstances seem impossible.
- 3. Why did the Israelites complain after seeing so many miracles?

 Answer: Their short-term focus led them to doubt. Like them, we often forget God's faithfulness in the past when facing new challenges.

Application:

- Remember God's past faithfulness in your current struggles.
- Trust that God provides, even when resources seem scarce.

Session 3: The Ten Commandments & The Covenant

Passages: Exodus 19-24

Key Theme: God's Law and Holiness

Discussion Questions & Answers

- 1. Why did God give the Israelites the Ten Commandments? Answer: To set them apart as His holy people and to establish moral laws for their relationship with Him and others.
- 2. How does the Old Covenant point to Jesus?

 Answer: The law reveals sin, showing our need for a Savior. Jesus fulfilled the law and established a New Covenant through His death (Matthew 5:17).
- 3. Why did the people fear God's presence on Mount Sinai?

 Answer: God's holiness was overwhelming, revealing their sinfulness.

 This foreshadows our need for Jesus as our mediator.

- Live in obedience, knowing God's law reveals His character.
- Recognize Jesus as the fulfillment of the law.

Session 4: The Golden Calf & God's Mercy

Passages: Exodus 32-34

Key Theme: Human Sin vs. God's Grace

Discussion Questions & Answers

1. Why did the Israelites turn to idol worship so quickly?

Answer: They lacked patience and trust in God's timing, seeking a visible representation of Him instead.

2. How did Moses intercede for the people?

Answer: He pleaded with God for mercy, foreshadowing Christ's role as our mediator (Hebrews 7:25).

3. What does God's response teach us about His character?

Answer: He is just, but also merciful, providing opportunities for repentance.

Application:

- Be patient in waiting for God's direction.
- Turn away from anything that takes priority over God.

Session 5: The Tabernacle - God's Presence Among His People

Passages: Exodus 25-40

Discussion Questions & Answers

Answer: Worship requires preparation, reverence, and a focus on God's presence.

- See Jesus as our ultimate High Priest and mediator.

Bible Study: The Book of Leviticus

Session 1: The Purpose of Leviticus - Holiness & Worship

Discussion Questions & Answers

1. Why does Leviticus focus so much on rules and rituals?
Answer: These laws were given to set Israel apart as a holy nation, teaching them how to live in a way that honors God.

2. What does it mean that God is holy, and how does that apply to us today? (Leviticus 11:44-45)

Answer: Holiness means being set apart from sin. Believers today are called to live distinctively, reflecting God's purity in our actions and hearts (I Peter I:15-16).

3. How does worship in Leviticus relate to how we worship today?

Answer: While we no longer offer sacrifices, true worship still involves reverence, obedience, and a heart devoted to God.

Application:

- · Evaluate how we can live in holiness daily.
- Approach worship with reverence and devotion.

Session 2: The Sacrificial System - Atonement for Sin

Passages: Leviticus 4-5, 16

Key Theme: Sin Requires Atonement

Discussion Questions & Answers

1. Why were sacrifices necessary in the Old Testament?

Answer: The sacrifices symbolized the cost of sin and pointed to Jesus, the ultimate sacrifice who would take away sin permanently (Hebrews 10:1-4).

2. What is the significance of the Day of Atonement (Leviticus 16)?

Answer: It was the most important day for Israel, where the High Priest made a sacrifice for the sins of the entire nation. It foreshadowed Jesus, our High Priest, who made a perfect atonement (Hebrews 9:11-12).

3. How does Jesus' sacrifice compare to the Old Testament sacrifices? Answer: Jesus' sacrifice was once and for all, fully satisfying God's justice (Hebrews 10:10-12).

Application:

- Recognize the cost of sin and the grace of Christ's sacrifice.
- Live in gratitude and obedience to God.

Session 3: Clean & Unclean Laws - Purity Before God

Passages: Leviticus 11-15

Key Theme: Spiritual and Physical Purity

Discussion Questions & Answers

I. Why did God give laws about clean and unclean things?

Answer: These laws taught Israel about purity, distinguishing them from other nations, and symbolized the separation between sin and holiness.

2. How do these laws point to Jesus?

Answer: Jesus fulfilled the purity laws by making all who trust in Him clean, not through external rituals but through His sacrifice (Mark 7:18-23).

3. How should we pursue spiritual purity today?

Answer: By guarding our hearts, avoiding sin, and seeking holiness through prayer, Scripture, and the Holy Spirit's guidance.

Application:

- Examine areas where we need to pursue purity.
- Depend on Jesus, who makes us spiritually clean.

Answer: We can approach God directly with confidence, knowing Jesus has made the way for us.

 Answer: When they looked at it in faith, they were healed—
 foreshadowing Jesus on the cross.
- 3. How does Jesus use this story to describe salvation? (John 3:14-15)

 Answer: Just as the Israelites had to look to the bronze serpent for healing, we must look to Christ in faith for eternal salvation.

Application:

- Fix our eyes on Jesus, our ultimate healer and Savior.
- Trust in God's provision for salvation, not our own works.

Session 5: Balaam and God's Sovereignty

Passages: Numbers 22-24

Key Theme: God's Control Over All Things

Discussion Questions & Answers

Who was Balaam, and why was he hired? (Numbers 22:2-6)
 Answer: Balaam was a pagan prophet hired by King Balak to curse Israel.

Answer: God used a donkey to rebuke Balaam and prevented him from cursing Israel, showing His ultimate control.

3. What can we learn from Balaam's story?

Answer: No one can oppose God's plans, and we should always submit to His will rather than seek personal gain.

- Seek God's will rather than selfish ambition.

- Sometimes God places us in specific situations to make a difference. We must be brave and act when called, even when it feels risky.
- Trust that God can use you for His purposes, even when you feel inadequate or fearful.

Session 4: Esther's Bold Action

Passages: Esther 5-6

Key Theme: God's Favor and the Turning of the Tide

Discussion Questions & Answers

1. What did Esther do to approach the king? (Esther 5:1-8)

Answer: Esther boldly approached King Xerxes without being summoned, risking her life. She invited the king and Haman to a banquet, asking for a second banquet to make her request known.

2. What happened during the banquet? (Esther 5:9-14)

Answer: Haman, although honored at the banquet, was enraged by Mordecai's refusal to bow to him. He planned to build a gallows to hang Mordecai.

3. How did God intervene on behalf of the Jews? (Esther 6:1-14)

Answer: That night, the king could not sleep, so he had the records read to him, discovering that Mordecai had previously saved his life but had not been rewarded. The king ordered Haman to honor Mordecai, turning Haman's plans upside down.

Application:

- Even when things seem to be going against us, trust that God is orchestrating events behind the scenes.
- Be bold in taking action when God calls you to speak or act for others, knowing He will give you favor.

Session 5: Haman's Fall and the Jews' Deliverance

Passages: Esther 7-8

Key Theme: Divine Justice and the Triumph of Good

Discussion Questions & Answers

I. What was Esther's plea to the king? (Esther 7:1-6)

Answer: Esther revealed Haman's plot to destroy the Jews, exposing him as the enemy and begging the king for mercy for her people.

- 2. What happened to Haman after his plot was exposed? (Esther 7:7-10) Answer: Haman was hanged on the very gallows he had prepared for Mordecai, demonstrating God's justice.
- 3. What decree did King Xerxes issue to protect the Jews? (Esther 8:1-17)

 Answer: The king allowed the Jews to defend themselves, and Mordecai was given Haman's estate and promoted to a high position. The Jews were granted the right to protect themselves from their enemies.

- Trust that God will bring justice, even when evil seems to prevail.
- Remember that God can use unexpected means to protect and deliver His people.

Session 6: The Feast of Purim and God's Faithfulness

Passages: Esther 9-10

Key Theme: Celebration, Gratitude, and the Sovereignty of God

Discussion Questions & Answers

- I. What did the Jews do to celebrate their deliverance? (Esther 9:20-32)

 Answer: The Jews established the Feast of Purim to celebrate their deliverance, giving gifts to one another and helping the poor.
- 2. What was the significance of the Feast of Purim? (Esther 9:26-28)

 Answer: The Feast of Purim was established as an annual reminder of God's faithfulness in saving the Jews from destruction. It emphasized the joy and gratitude for God's intervention.
- 3. How does the book of Esther reveal God's sovereignty?

 Answer: Although God is not explicitly mentioned in the book, His providence and control over events are evident in every part of the story, showing that He works in and through seemingly ordinary events for His purposes.

- Celebrate God's faithfulness and deliverance in your life, remembering His sovereignty.
- Pass on the message of God's goodness and justice to others, sharing His faithfulness with future generations.

Bible Study: The Book of Job

Suffering, Faith, and God's Sovereignty
6 Sessions

Session 1: Job's Tragedy and His Response

Passages: Job 1-2

Key Theme: The Testing of Faith

Discussion Questions & Answers

1. What were the circumstances that led to Job's suffering? (Job 1:6-22)

Answer: Job's suffering was the result of a heavenly conversation between Satan and God. Satan challenged Job's righteousness, claiming that he only served God because of his blessings. God allowed Satan to test Job's faith by taking away his possessions, children, and health.

2. How did Job respond to his losses? (Job 1:20-22)

Answer: Job mourned deeply but did not sin or blame God. He acknowledged that everything he had came from God and that God had the right to take it away.

3. What additional suffering did Job experience in chapter 2? (Job 2:1-10)

Answer: Satan afflicted Job with painful sores, but Job still did not curse God. His wife urged him to curse God and die, but Job maintained his faith.

- In the midst of suffering, we are called to trust in God's sovereignty and respond with humility and faith.
- When faced with hardship, remember that our possessions and blessings are gifts from God, and we must trust Him through trials.

Session 2: Job's Friends Arrive

Passages: Job 3-4

Key Theme: The Silence of Grief and the Nature of Comfort

Discussion Questions & Answers

Answer: Job lamented his birth, wishing he had never been born. He questioned why he was suffering and longed for an explanation from God.

2. How did Job's friends initially respond to his suffering? (Job 2:11-13)

Answer: Job's friends—Eliphaz, Bildad, and Zophar—came to comfort him. They sat with him in silence for seven days, showing deep sympathy for his grief.

3. What was Eliphaz's view on suffering? (Job 4:1-21)

Answer: Eliphaz suggested that Job's suffering was a result of his own sin, implying that God only punishes the wicked and rewards the righteous.

Application:

- Be sensitive to the grief of others, and understand that sometimes silence is the best form of comfort.
- Avoid jumping to conclusions about the reasons for someone's suffering, and refrain from blaming them without understanding their situation.

Session 3: Job's Response and Continued Despair

Passages: Job 6-7

Key Theme: The Pain of Unanswered Questions

Discussion Questions & Answers

1. How did Job respond to Eliphaz's accusation? (Job 6:1-30)

Answer: Job responded by expressing his immense pain and frustration.

He questioned why God was allowing him to suffer and how his friends could think he had done something wrong.

- 2. What did Job say about the brevity and difficulty of life? (Job 7:1-21)

 Answer: Job lamented the fleeting nature of life, describing it as filled with turmoil and pain. He felt as though his life was a constant battle, and he questioned why God allowed him to live in such misery.
- 3. What does Job's response reveal about the nature of suffering?

 Answer: Job's response reflects the raw, honest struggle of dealing with suffering, especially when there are no clear answers. It also shows the human tendency to search for meaning in the midst of pain.

Application:

- It's okay to express feelings of frustration and confusion when dealing with suffering. God can handle our honest emotions and questions.
- We can find comfort in knowing that we are not alone in our struggles, as Job's journey mirrors many of our own emotional experiences in times of pain.

Session 4: Job's Defense of His Integrity

Passages: Job 8-10

Key Theme: Righteousness and the Question of Divine Justice

Discussion Questions & Answers

- 1. What was Bildad's response to Job's claim of innocence? (Job 8:1-22) Answer: Bildad argued that Job's suffering must be a result of sin and that God would restore him if he repented. He insisted that the innocent do not suffer, and that Job needed to turn to God.
- 2. How did Job respond to Bildad's accusation? (Job 9:1-35)

 Answer: Job acknowledged God's sovereignty but expressed confusion about why the righteous suffer. He felt helpless in defending himself and admitted that no one could contend with God's power.

3. What does Job's struggle with understanding God's justice reveal about the nature of suffering?

Answer: Job's struggle shows that suffering is often not a direct result of personal sin and that God's justice can sometimes be mysterious. We are not always able to understand the reasons behind our pain, but we are called to trust in God's ultimate goodness.

Application:

- Understand that suffering does not always come as a consequence of sin, and we should not assume others are being punished for wrongdoing.
- Trust that God's justice is perfect, even when we cannot fully comprehend it.

Session 5: The Lord Speaks and Reveals His Sovereignty

Passages: Job 38-40

Discussion Questions & Answers

- Humble yourself before God when you face suffering, recognizing that His wisdom far surpasses our own.
- Trust that God's ways are higher than our ways, and we can find peace in knowing He is in control.

Discussion Questions & Answers

1. How did Job respond after God spoke to him? (Job 42:1-6)

Answer: God restored Job's fortunes, giving him twice as much as he had before, and blessed him with a long life and a large family. Job's friends were rebuked and asked to offer sacrifices, and Job prayed for them.

3. What does Job's restoration teach us about suffering and God's faithfulness?

Answer: Job's restoration teaches that, while suffering is painful and mysterious, God is faithful to restore, redeem, and bless His people. Our faithfulness in suffering can lead to greater intimacy with God and eventual restoration.

Application:

• Remember that even in suffering, God's faithfulness remains, and He can bring restoration in His timing.

•	Respond to suffering with humility and trust, knowing that God's ultimate purpose is to bring good from our pain.

3. What is the ultimate outcome of living according to God's wisdom? Answer: The outcome is peace, success, and a life that pleases God. When we live in alignment with God's wisdom, we find stability, prosperity, and joy in our lives.

- Submit your plans to God and trust that His sovereignty will guide you to the best outcomes.
- Develop patience and self-control, recognizing their power in living wisely and peacefully.
